ACTION: NEW HEADQUARTERS FOR GIRL GUIDES



Conservative controlled Hillingdon Council has approved funding of £284k to rebuild the Girl Guide facility in Vernon Drive Harefield. The facility is used by 90 plus girls and women a week and the funding comes as a result of a request from the District Guider to the ward councillors for assistance.

IMPROVEMENT TO ROAD SAFETY FOR SCHOOLS



Conservative run Hillingdon council has invested £1.7 Million putting safety camera outside every school in Hillingdon. This is to identify motorists who endanger the lives of both children and adults by ignoring yellow lines and KEEP CLEAR areas.

The new cameras are linked to the DVLA and offenders will be identified by their vehicle registration plate and a fine issued directly to their home address.
